#### A Brief Note on the Planning Project :

**Objective:** To achieve holistic and sustainable development rural and urban areas through efficient and equitable utilization of resources. This studio intends to facilitate students with the required knowledge and skills for preparing a regional plan, so as to achieve sustainable and harmonious development in the future; through a comprehensive understanding of its setting, context, linkages, legal frameworks and hierarchy.

**Problem Statement:** It is general experience that if things are left to market forces all economic and other activities (industries, commercial, banking, science, art, literature, education, etc) tend to get concentrated in a few regions. Once this happens like as a historical accident or otherwise, there is a tendency for regional disparities to widen. In this era of increasing social and political consciousness it becomes necessary to counter these tendencies effectively and it can be done only with the help of well defined district planning strategy as a spatial planning technique. It could generalize the spatial complexity (location, distribution and interaction) of human, nature phenomenon.

**Stages of Work:** The overall process of preparation of strategy for the development of a Region (identified in course of time) from July 10 to November 03, 2017 as per the academic program will be in five stages mentioned below.

**Stage1**: Literature Review: Concepts, Planning Techniques (including delineation techniques), Guidelines, Acts & Case Studies.

**Stage 3**: Data Collection & Situation Assessment: Primary Data Collection, (consultative meetings, and interactive workshops on data/resource mobilization), Land Use Map Preparation, Existing Situation Assessment of the study region through various Regional Planning Techniques
